Course Regulations for the three-year BA Programs

Regulations and Programs

Course regulations for the three-year BA Programs comply with ministerial provisions (according to DPR 22nd January 2008, nr. 482). Program curricula, detailed contents concerning subjects, additional training activities and evaluation methods will be defined every year by NABA faculty and Program Directors and included in a document named “Course Regulations”.

Educational Activities

Educational activities include curricular subjects, additional training activities, individual and group study activities.

Curricular subjects are divided into basic learning activities, subject specific learning activities, integrative learning activities and additional learning activities, some mandatory and some elective, according to ministerial regulations, and consist in theoretical-critical, design and technical subjects.

NABA teaching methods include frontal lessons, lab sessions and exercises, seminars, workshops and conferences and are organised in modules of various lengths (one-year, one-semester or intensive modules).

Additional activities include English language and basic IT, realisation of individual artistic production and research projects, participation in cross-disciplinary activities, international exchange programs and internships and further activities aimed at providing students with the necessary skills to enter the job market.

Academic Credits

One academic credit (credito formativo accademico - CFA) corresponds to an average of 25 hours' work time.

The credits envisaged for each subject can only be obtained upon passing the relevant examination for that specific subject.

The credits envisaged for the other educational activities can only be awarded through specific official acknowledgment procedures.

The average workload and learning time for a student that is following a full-time academic curriculum has been conventionally established as 60 academic credits (CFA) per year corresponding to a total workload of 1500 hours of study.

Internship and Portfolio

Internships are part of the educational activities and are regulated by the provisions of Law nr. 196/1997 and by specific academic regulations. As an alternative to a period of internship, students can carry out research or production activities under the supervision of a professor at the Academy in

collaboration with public bodies and businesses. The development of an artistic and professional portfolio that is then presented and evaluated during the final graduation exam represents an integral part of a student's educational path as well.

Study Plan

By the end of the first year (the final deadline will be communicated each year) students have to submit a draft study plan in which they choose among the various elective courses and among the additional educational activities envisaged in the Program Curriculum. While drafting the study plan, students will have to respect the subject sequence indicated in the Program Curriculum. Students' study plans will be automatically approved in case they are consistent with the Curriculum. Otherwise they will be subject to the Program Director's approval. In the following academic years, students will have to submit again the study plan that can be identical to the one that had already been approved or contain some variations and indicate the deadlines for filling up any educational debt that students might have accumulated in the previous year due to failing some of the exams envisaged by the Program Curriculum. The possibility to modify the study plan and introduce subjects that are activated on alternate years or open to a limited number of students is subject to NABA programming needs. A student's admission to the final examination for the attainment of the degree is dependent on the correspondence between the last approved study plan and the number of credits that have been effectively awarded to that student.

Attendance

Attendance is mandatory. Specific exceptions to mandatory attendance can be made upon presenting a written request within the deadline established in the examination regulations for the following reasons: health reasons, family reasons, internships, participation in projects that have a documented artistic and professional value.

Progression of Studies

Students will carry out their educational activities according to the schedule envisaged by the approved study plan. Students can take exams for those subjects in which they meet the relevant attendance requirements and as long as lessons for those specific subjects have finished and that all the requirements indicated in the Program Curriculum have been met.

Students can normally choose among three examination sessions: summer, fall and winter sessions. For courses continuing for three years and structured in one-year modules the year-progression order shall be respected. Students cannot take examinations for more than one one-year module for the same subject in the same examination session. In case a course can only be attended after passing the exam of the previous year module for the same course,

students shall sit for that exam within the fall examination session. Requests to make exceptions shall be presented in written form to the Program Director.

In order to sit for exams students will have to present a written request within the deadline indicated in the academic calendar and shall specify the exams that they want to take in each specific examination session. In order to be entitled to sit for exams students need to have submitted their study plan and to have paid the relevant tuition and fees. Exams taken in the winter session pertain to the previous academic year and therefore do not require any registration.

Degree Attainment

To be awarded the final Degree, students shall have acquired 180 academic credits (CFA). The final degree is awarded upon passing a final examination consisting in the presentation and discussion of the students' portfolios in front of a Commission and of a thesis or design project made up of an artistic and production research work and a historical-critical or methodological introduction. In order to be admitted to this final examination, students shall have been awarded a minimum of 66 points. According to the regulations that are currently in force, the Commission, after evaluating the works, the portfolio and the thesis presented by a student, can add up to 10 points to the admission points - calculated on a 110-scale - giving up to 5 points to the thesis and attributing the remaining points to works and portfolio. If a student is admitted to the final examination with more than 100 points, the commission can award a final grade of 110 cum Laude. The "cum Laude" awarding is dependent on the acknowledgement of the relevance of a student's attainments and on the Commission's unanimous judgement. There are three final examination sessions each year: summer, fall and winter sessions. The final examination represents a public event and the announcement of the final result is a public act. The final degrees awarded comply with the regulations that are currently in force.

Academic Calendar

The Academic Calendar is structured into two semesters, each one includes a didactical session and some examination sessions (summer, fall and winter). Each didactical session consists of 12 weeks devoted to one-year and one-semester courses and of 3 weeks devoted to intensive, transversal and cross-disciplinary activities. Lessons start in October and finish by mid-June.

The summer examination session takes place in June and July. In addition to this, these two months can be devoted to lab activities for the preparation of exhibitions or projects, to optional specialization laboratories or to intensive English language courses.

Preparatory Italian language courses for foreign students usually take place in September. Lessons are usually Mondays through Fridays, however specific sessions of intensive and extra activities might take place on Saturdays and

specific cultural activities can be organised for the weekend. Working students sessions take place late in the afternoon and in the evening.

Admission Prerequisites and Language Requirements for International Students

Students wishing to attend the Undergraduate three-year BA Programs are required:

- 1) to hold a secondary school diploma that is validated by the Italian representative authority in the students' home country and that is recognized as equivalent to the Italian secondary school diploma (having followed a period of study lasting at least 12 years);
- 2) to pass an admission exam;
- 3) to demonstrate proficiency in the Italian language.

According to Italian laws, a secondary school diploma is considered valid for admission only if obtained after at least 12 years of education. International students wishing to state the validity of their secondary school diploma can enquire at the Italian representative authority in the home country or contact NABA International Relations Office. The admission exam is compulsory for all the Italian Academies within the AFAM system; in NABA it consists in a project development, which varies according to the courses selected, and in a vocational individual interview, meant to assess the motivations of the candidates and their language skills. All NABA BA Programs are taught in Italian, therefore international students need to master the Italian language to be able to attend classes successfully. According to the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages, the required level of knowledge of Italian would be B1.

NABA offers to international applicants, without any additional costs, a mandatory three-week intensive course of technical Italian for design during the month of September.

NABA intensive course of technical Italian for design is meant to improve and refine students' language skills, hence students are highly recommended to acquire at least a lower intermediate (B1) level of Italian before enrolling into the course by means of attending the following classes:

- Far East and Middle East: 500 hrs;
- Eastern Europe: 360 hrs;
- other European countries (including English speaking countries): 320 hrs;
- Spanish and Portuguese speaking countries: 160 hrs.

Students who have already reached the required language entry level (B1) will be able to follow courses of a higher level that will give them a stronger background which will allow them to understand better and in a more profitable way academic classes.

Application Procedure for International BA Students

Applicants shall follow the application procedure outlined below:

- applicants shall request NABA pre-enrolment form to the International Relations Office or download it from the website;
- they shall fill out the pre-enrolment form with full details;
- they shall pay the admission exam fee by wire transfer specifying the cause of payment and the candidate's name (i.e.: John Smith's exam fee - NABA BA Program in Fashion Design);
- they shall send to NABA a copy of the wire transfer receipt and a copy of the pre-enrolment form, together with a photocopy of a valid identity card or passport, by fax or by email (scanned copy).

Non-EU citizens should contact the Italian Embassy/Consulate in their own country of residence by a deadline that is annually set by the Italian Ministry of Education, University and Research (MIUR) in order to meet the Italian ministerial requirements for the admission of non-EU citizens. Please see the Table below for detailed information on the deadlines that have been set for 2010 (for enrolments in the academic year 2010/2011).

Students with a foreign secondary school title must provide the following documents in order to complete the enrolment procedure:

- secondary school diploma that is validated by Italian Representative authorities in the students' home country and that is recognized as equivalent to the Italian Secondary School Diploma (having followed a period of study lasting at least 12 years);
- declaration of the Diplomatic or Consular Representatives that have the jurisdiction on certifying the value of diplomas ("Dichiarazione di valore in loco");
- if the diploma was obtained after 11 years, in order for it to be considered valid for admission to an Italian university, it must be integrated with 1 or 2 years of college or university, with all exams passed and with admission respectively to the second or third year at the applicant's original university;
- a certificate attesting that the University entrance examination in the Country of origin has been passed, if required by law (e.g. Vestibular for Brazil, Selectividad for Spain, Prova de Afericao o Prova Geral de Acesso ao Ensino Superior for Portugal, etc.).

All documents written in a foreign language must be accompanied by an official translation in Italian; the translation must be obtained by the applicant and must be certified and legalized by the relevant Italian Embassy/Consulate.

According to the regulations of the Italian Ministry of Education, University and Research enrolment to the Bachelor of Arts is subject to passing an admission exam. Students can take the admission exam either in the online session (May or July) or directly on-site, on NABA campus, during the spring (May) summer

(July) or fall session (September). The admission exam test is designed to help NABA understand applicants' potential and motivation for the chosen field of study. The online admission test has the benefit of letting international students take it from their home countries.

Admission Exam

The admission exam consists in:

Research on a given theme. Two weeks prior to the admission test applicants will receive the subject area (that varies according to the chosen BA Program) on which they will have to research, collect images, information, newspaper/magazine articles, pictures and anything else they will consider appropriate.

Moreover, applicants will have to prepare a motivational letter in which they explain the motivations that drove them to wish to study at NABA and why they chose that specific BA program. This letter shall be submitted on the first day of the admission exam and it will be a subject for discussion during the vocational individual interview.

Finally, applicants will need to prepare a topic that might be discussed during the vocational individual interview.

Project Development whose purpose is to assess the applicants' potential, as well as their expressive and creative abilities. Students, according to the BA program of their choice, will be invited to develop a project theme to be chosen among those proposed by the examination board. Creative proposals might be presented through drawings, sketches, free-hand projects, accompanied by a text explaining and motivating the applicants' choices. Images might be taken from magazines or already existing material.

Vocational Individual Interview. Through this interview the examination board intends to evaluate applicants' general cultural level, not as a mere evaluation of notions, but in connection with attitudes, motivations and knowledge of arts, design (in its general aspects), communication and new technologies. Throughout the interview students will have the opportunity to discuss the project development that has previously been examined and evaluated by the examination board. During the Interview, each applicant is encouraged to present his/her own portfolio (not compulsory). The works included in the portfolio should provide insight into the student's creative potential and, if possible, give some insight into the choice of the area of study.

Language Assessment. The Admission Exam is also aimed at verifying that the applicant has reached the minimum level of Italian required (B1). The level of Italian of those students taking the on-site admission exam will be tested throughout the individual interview. The level of Italian of those students taking the on-line admission exam will be tested through the online language assessment procedure (via Skype).

The language assessment is exclusively oral (production and comprehension), it is carried out through a video conference with an Italian teacher on a given date and at a given time that have to be agreed upon in advance and lasts about 20 minutes.

BA Transfer Students

Transfer students (students wishing to enrol in the 2nd or 3rd year) are required to send:

- digital portfolio (not returnable);
- motivation letter;
- secondary school diploma translation, legalization and corresponding value declaration issued by the closest Italian Embassy or Consulate;
- certificate from the original university which includes all exams passed, the credit points awarded, the subject area, final mark and date of exams passed and value declaration issued by the closest Italian Embassy or Consulate certifying that the university is recognized in that country;
- programs of the exams passed at the original university. Programs should be similar to the program requirements of NABA course chosen by the student. The certificate should be translated into Italian or English;
- certificate attesting the knowledge of the Italian language, or letter of purpose stating the student's commitment to learn Italian.

Please be aware that the students' assignment to any given year of the course is at discretion of NABA academic staff who will evaluate previous studies and portfolio.

Special Programs

Diploma Programs

Students who have completed only 11 years of education before applying to NABA, can ask to enrol in the three-year Diploma Programs.

Diploma Programs have the same curricula and the same examinations as the BA Programs, however they lead to the awarding of a NABA diploma.

To enrol in Diploma Programs, students have to send:

- portfolio (not returnable);
- document attesting their previous studies, however they do not need to have them translated and legalised by the closest Italian Embassy or Consulate, nor to ask for the Value Declaration Certificate.

Before being admitted to a Diploma Program, students will have to take an admission examination. To be awarded the final Diploma, students shall pass all exams on the approved Study Plan and a final examination.

Diploma Programs also foresee students' access to the second and third year with the Transfer Student status.

Certificate Programs

These programs are intended for students who do not want to commit to attend a long-term educational path and desire to follow only one year of the Diploma Program or a more tailor-made study plan.

Certificate Program students are not required to pass an admission examination, however they will have to agree a suitable study plan with NABA Program Coordinators before the beginning of the academic year in September. Certificate Programs lead to the attainment of an attendance certificate. Students wishing to obtain more detailed transcripts have to sit for the examinations of the subjects included in the study plan defined with NABA Program Coordinators.

Applicants are highly suggested to enrol by the end of June as NABA can only accept a limited number of students in these programs. Applications sent after that deadline might not be considered.

Studying at NABA

Students

About 1200 students coming from all over Italy and from more than 40 foreign countries currently attend NABA three-year BA Programs. Studying at NABA means having the opportunity to meet professionals and artists from manifold professional fields, to participate in numerous extra-didactical activities and to meet students from all over the world.

These meetings and the various collaborations that have been activated by NABA allow students to enrich their artistic and professional curriculum and to establish relations that will be helpful when accessing the job market.

Cycles of meetings, seminars and conferences - among which it is worth mentioning the cycle of cultural appointments "Wednesday at NABA" - are the occasion to meet Italian and foreign artists and to get to know the international scene.

Campus and Facilities

Lessons take place on NABA's campus located inside an industrial complex that has recently been renovated with respect to its notable architectural value. NABA is located in one of Milan's historical districts called Navigli (canals), one of the most attractive and liveliest areas in the city. The campus also boasts excellent IT infrastructure and includes computer graphics, editing video, 2D and 3D modelling and sound design laboratories, as well as tailoring, print-making, model-making, painting and light design laboratories.

An Atelier for plastic, metal and wood processing, as well as for jewellery making is available to students in NABA branch site located in via Col di Lana. The campus also includes NABASITE, an exhibition space hosting Italian and foreign artists' exhibitions, and NABAR, the students' cafeteria, a refreshment bar and a meeting place where parties and events in collaboration with external partners are occasionally organised.

A reading room and computer room are also available to students and can be accessed freely also after lesson time.

Living in Milan

Milan is a big metropolis with an international dimension that hosts the main Italian entrepreneurial and production activities: from publishing to advertising, from small artisan ateliers to hi-tech companies. It is the city of architects, designers, stylists, entrepreneurs, graphic designers, creative minds and publishers. Students who decide to attend a university in Milan will find an active context and will have the opportunity to make experiences and comparisons that will be helpful to them when taking up a profession.

In addition to this, the vast presence of theatres, museums, sports facilities, concert and music halls within the city area will offer to students - that are

entitled to discounts and facilitations - varied free time activities. Upon presenting NABA student card, students will be granted special discounts on the entry tickets for museums, exhibitions, cinemas, theatres, sports centers and cultural venues that have signed an agreement with the Milanese University System and are entitled to special fares when using public transportation means. NABA has also signed a number of agreements with shops located close to the campus.

NABAFuturarium

NABAFuturarium is the essential on campus link between the academy and the real world job market.

At NABAFuturarium students test and improve their skills under the guidance of professors and professionals and have the opportunity to deal with problems posed by external clients: companies that want to commit to social projects, non-profit organisations that need to set up new communication paths, public bodies that look for innovative ways of dealing and communicating with users. Thanks to NABAFuturarium students can experience a guided growth going beyond the borders of the professional environment. The experiences made at NABAFuturarium involve a student's whole personality because they are closely related to real problems: through NABAFuturarium tomorrow's reality - that students will have to face in the future - is already included in today's educational path.

NABA Faculty

NABA professors are professionals and artists that enrich teaching with energies and skills that are constantly updated and work hand in hand with a team in charge of scientific direction, didactic coordination and students' relations. A number of services and facilities acting as a support to didactics are available to students.

Evaluation and Monitoring

The Academy adopts an internal evaluation system to monitor didactic and research activities, actions aimed at supporting the university study right and administrative management in compliance with the Quality System UNI ENISO9001:2000 procedures and the ministerial regulations in force.

In order to provide consistent statistical data, NABA carries out an annual monitoring of the data regarding students' enrolment, students' careers and professional placement of NABA graduates.

Students have to fill in questionnaires to evaluate single courses, extra activities, general services and didactics in order to guarantee a constant improvement of didactics and services.

After the three-year Programs

In order to meet the need for specialised education, NABA has developed an educational offer of Master Programs and two-year MA Programs attracting students coming from Italian and foreign universities and representing a specialization opportunity that is offered at particular advantageous conditions to students who have already completed a three-year BA Program at NABA.

Student Services

International Relations Office

In order to promote the development of International Relations and to assist International Students, NABA has created an International Relations Office.

This office provides information on programs, students' services, language requirements and facilitates the admission and integration of international students into the academic life.

Accommodation Service

NABA supports students in finding suitable accommodation upon arrival.

NABA accommodation service consists in matching students' requests (according to their budgets) with suitable rooms or apartments.

According to the information given by the students NABA provides at least two alternatives meeting their requests.

NABA provides support in calling the landlord and in giving directions on how to get to the apartment.

Once students have visited some apartments and decided to rent one, NABA staff will help them in understanding the rental contract.

International Exchange Programs

NABA BA students can participate in exchange programmes with more than fifty European and extra-European universities and academies which have signed a bilateral agreement with NABA (LLP/Erasmus Programme and other exchange programmes).

The exchange can last from three to twelve months. The exchange period will be fully recognised by NABA on condition that the study plan followed abroad is compatible with the one envisaged by NABA.

The Exchange Program Office will take care of all the administrative and bureaucratic procedures. Students will remain enrolled at NABA, will not pay any further tuition fees to the receiving institution and will have the same duties and rights as the students regularly enrolled in the receiving institution. In addition to this, the receiving institution has the duty to provide incoming students all the necessary information to find accommodation for the exchange period.

Students may also receive a financial contribution from the European Union

which will help them cover some of the expenses they will encounter. Being granted this kind of scholarship implies obtaining the Erasmus student status and thus a number of advantages and benefits. The institutions listed in the following pages have signed agreements with NABA for students' exchange programs.

Internship and Placement Office

NABA Internship and Placement Office is available to all NABA graduates (up to the second year after the attainment of the degree) and to all NABA students, usually during their last year of study, in the summer period or after they have obtained their course directors' authorization.

The service is available every day upon appointment and is aimed at helping students in all the stages of the internship: from finding a suitable internship to preparing for the job interview and finally evaluating the experience. Students are also supported in the development of self-promotion tools: drafting a CV, a motivational letter and organising their professional portfolio.

The Internship and Placement Office also organises training sessions and gives advice on contracts and employment regulations.

Counselling

The Counselling service provides individual advice upon appointment and is aimed at helping students who are experiencing difficulties in adjusting to academic life or who are questioning their motivation.

This service intends to favour students' aware and responsible choices and to provide methodological support to students who are planning and designing their own educational and professional path.

NABA Web Site/Newsletter/Reserved Area

Students are constantly kept up-to-date on NABA opportunities and initiatives through NABA web site that includes a public and a reserved area for internal communications. In this reserved area students can consult the Student Service Guide, the updated Curricula, the detailed program of each subject, professors' resumes, the complete Didactic Regulations, the timetable of courses and labs, forms, information or notices published by the secretary office or concerning contests, internships, scholarships, tutoring opportunities, exchange programs and cultural events.

Each student is provided with a mail-box and automatically receives NABA Newsletter that is sent to about 9000 addresses and represents another tool to give visibility to NABA professors' and students' initiatives.

Library

NABA library contains books and magazines related to the main subjects of interest of NABA courses and all the students' theses starting from 1980 (NABA foundation year). Videotapes and DVDs of Italian and foreign films and

subscriptions to various magazines and journals specialised in our fields of interest enrich the heritage of the library.

Next to the library, there is a reading room where students can do their research, read, work and study. Any lecture notes and material prepared by NABA professors as a support to their lessons are available in the library as well as the complete records of contests in which students might be interested.

The library is available to NABA students and professors but can also be visited by everybody upon appointment.

Scholarships and Financial Aid

Special Tuitions

Despite the lack of public financing, NABA has adopted an academic policy aimed at supporting talented students who do not have the necessary financial means to attend NABA. In order to meet their needs, NABA offers the possibility to attend in the evening the BA in "Fashion Design" and in "Graphic Design and Art Direction" on easy terms and the possibility to collaborate as tutors with the Academy (starting from the 2nd course year). Every year special calls for scholarships are published. The announcement specifying conditions and parameters for the academic year 2010/11 will be available from spring 2010.

NABA Scholarships for International Students

In order to attract talented international students and create an international academic environment, NABA provides a number of scholarships reserved to foreign students.

Full scholarships covering the total tuition fee are reserved to international students from the following countries: Argentina, Bulgaria, Croatia, Czech Republic, Estonia, Indonesia, Jordan, Latvia, Lebanon, Lithuania, Mexico, Poland, Romania, Slovenia, Serbia, Thailand and Hungary. Deadline: 6 April 2010.

Partial scholarships reserved to international students from foreign countries. Deadline: 6 April 2010.

A special scholarship in memory of Belkisa Segetalo is reserved to international students from the following countries: Bosnia & Herzegovina, Croatia, Macedonia, Montenegro, Norway, Serbia and Slovenia. Deadline: 6 April 2010.

DSU NABA

NABA, through DSU (Diritto allo Studio Universitario) coordinates and provides interventions and services addressed to the implementation of equal access to university studies as foreseen by regional law n. 33/2004. Through DSU, enrolled BA students can apply for a DSU scholarship and benefit from the grants and services, based on financial criteria (low family income). The call for scholarships for the academic year 2010/2011 will be published in July 2010 on NABA website (www.naba.it). Please notice that the financial requirement for participating in the call for scholarships is defined on the basis of the Indicator of the Equivalent Economical Situation (in Italian I.S.E.E.).
